Most passengers originated from Wester Ross, Sutherland and East Inverness-shire. Ship arrived Sept. 15. The emigrants were recruited by John Ross, an agent for the Philadelphia Land Company which owned 200,000 acres of wilderness land in Pictou. The *Hector* was owned by John Pagan.

Passengers came from Kirkcudbrightshire and Dumfriesshire. Many of the emigrants later moved on to Pictou. The group included 4 masons, 1 blacksmith, 2 wheelwrights, 2 farmers, 3 joiners, 9 labourers and 1 sailor. The Captain's name is given as William Sherwin in the *Lloyds Shipping Register*.

Appendix B. Passenger List I

The Hector, 1773

[Note: This list, unlike those which follow, is not an authentic contemporary tabulation. It is instead one which has been attributed to one of the passengers on the vessel (probably one of the McKays), likely made years after the passage, and handed down from generation to generation in the Pictou area. It is virtually identical with another similar list, also lost, produced by William McKenzie again years after the event, and reprinted by George Patterson in his *A History of the County of Pictou Nova Scotia*, Montreal 1877, 450-6. This version was printed by George McLaren in *The Pictou Book: Stories of Our Past*, New Glasgow 1954, 31-4. Although its provenance is less certain than that of the later lists, I have included it because it is the only surviving roster of Highland emigrants to what is now Canada from the first wave (1770-5) of emigration. Its divisions do suggest the pricing mechanism for the passage, with those over 8 years paying full price, children 2-8 half price, and infants under 2 travelling free.]

"When the LADY GRAY left Cromarty, Scotland, she had on board 240 passengers, 75 of whom were to get off at Pictou and the remainder were for Quebec. From a dread of further suffering at sea, and on viewing the fertility of this portion of Nova Scotia and the prospects it presented for industrious farmers, about 135 of their number were persuaded to remain in Pictou.

[Note: As the notation on the bottom of list VI indicates, the *British Queen's* passengers were part of the same group aboard the *Lucy* and the *Jane*. The list follows much the same pattern as the preceding two, but is more systematic about occupation and includes a column labelled 'amount', which clearly records the passage money paid by the several families. Certain key amounts recur, but not all adults appear to have paid the same, some paying £3 17s, another £2 1s, and several £1 18s 6d. In any event, although these were extremely low rates by contemporary standards, they again indicate that it took capital to emigrate. John Pagan by 1772 was now a shareholder in the Philadelphia Company, and was also the owner of the Bark "Hector" an interesting fact in itself. We know the Bark "Hector" made an earlier passage to Boston with Scottish immigrants in 1770. A John Ross was hired in Boston to act as Agent for Pagan. Pagan and Ross returned to Scotland to Solicit more immigrants for the settlement in Pictou. 47

According to popular folk-lore Pagan & Ross offered: free land, free provisions for a year, and FREE PASSAGE. But an Advertisement in the Edinburgh Courier dated September 1772 Reads:

" John Pagan will take care that she (the Brig Hector) be a good sufficient ship and engages to transport the said settlers to Nova Scotia, at the easy rate of 3 pounds 5 shillings sterling freight, for each full passenger. One person of 8 years of age and upward to be a full freight: Two persons of 4 years old and upward to 8 years to be counted as one fare. And all under 2 years old to pay nothing." The passage money to be paid before the ship leaves Scotland. Twelve weeks provisions will be laid in for the voyage which the advertisement claimed would be made in 4 weeks stating the Distance to Nova Scotia was little more than half ~~xxx~~ the distance to North Carolina. The advertisement further read: ^{once} ~~xxx~~ a week each full fare would receive 3 lbs of beef, 4 lb. of bread, 4 lb. of oatmeal. And twice a week each full fare would Receive barley, broth and burgue and one Scots pint of water each day.

To encourage speedy settlement of the lands the Proprietors Pagan & Withers offered: Land at 6 pence an acre to the first 20 families to sign on.

One paper went so FAR as to say "How could Reverend Dr. Witherspoon the co-author of this enticing advertisement have knowledge of N.S. and the climate and conditions, when he lived very comfortably in New Jersey as the Principal of a College. One thousand miles away from the area he was promoting.

The "Hector" set sail in late June 1773 and picked up 10 families and 5 single men from the Clyde, then 33 families and 26 single men in Glasgow.

single men from the Clyde, then 33 families and 26 single men in Glasgow. The voyage took just over 2½ months arriving Pictou Co. Sept. 15 1773, a far cry from the advertised 4 weeks. Let it be noted here, the Brig. Hector was in poor condition and sank shortly after arriving here in 1773. Again not quite the sound vessel promised in the Advertisement. During the crossing 18 persons died of smallpox and dysentery.

Of all the families that arrived only 27 stayed in the Pictou County area as we know it today. Even the 27 families did not stay here at first but settled elsewhere and they or their children returned only after the settlement was increased by other immigrants.

The Hector settlers were weakened in their influence by 2 major causes:

1. Only a few could speak English, the majority being Gaelic Speaking.
2. They scattered themselves over the county whereas the "BETSY" settlers stayed together in the small area of the Harbour front. Hector People settled areas such as: McLellans Mountain which was settled by John McLennan and Hugh Fraser among others.

Hector people settled West River, Merigomish, Loch Broom, The Intervale Middle River Etc.

The greatest disadvantage these Hector settlers had was their lack of MEANS Yet in face of this they prospered, a testimony to their enterprising ways. Thrift and pride overcame adversity as demonstrated in their lives and their descendants.

INFORMATION ON PASSENGERS OF THE SHIP "SARAH" – 1801

"In all 350, including Men, women, children and infants, making the number of full passengers to be 250. Calculating the age of those under 16 at 830 ½ years, and therefore dividing by 16, making a full passenger, those above 16 years, 199; those below by the above calculation, 51. A total of 250 to go on board the ship "Sarah" burdened 350 tons.

Customs House, Fort William, 8th June, 1801. These certify to the honbl Board of Customs that what is wrote on the twelve preceding pages is a true and exact duplicate and copy of the list of emigrants furnished and given in to us the 4th Curr. By Mr. Hugh Denoon, Pictou, Nova Scotia, dated at Inverness, the 1st instant. Intended to be shipped by him at this port on board the "Sarah", of Liverpool, Smith, master, to be furnished by themselves in provisions for the voyage; and that on examining Mr. Denoon's calculations of full passengers we find the same not exact. The numbers we find by the list to be 350 souls, of which of full passengers above 16 years, 206, and 144 children under 16, whose ages amounts to 832 years and these years divided by 16 make of full passengers 52. A total of 258.

Thus we see that 350 passengers came to Pictou in the ship Sarah, which weighed 350 tons. It took three months for the Sarah to cross the Atlantic Ocean and some of the passengers died of whopping cough or small pox on the voyage. You can imagine the state they were in on arrival in Pictou, and the responsibility thrown on the local government. It was to help pay the expenses of such immigrants that Nova Scotia passed an act putting a tax of five shillings on every passenger to the colony.

In the early 1880s, immigrants were swarming to Nova Scotia from British Isles. Most of them were penniless, and the shipmasters used to pack them into the holds of the old sailing ships which were poorly ventilated and infested with vermin. Here the passengers might be penned in for ten or eleven weeks while their ships crossed the Atlantic, so it is no wonder that disease spread like wild-fire and the ships were sometimes called immigrant "coffins." Most of the passengers on the DOVE and the SARAH seem to have been farmers, labourers, tenants, and spinsters. Incidentally, the term "spinster" at that time simple meant a woman who could spin, and many of the so-called "spinsters" on these lists were the wives of the men listed immediately before. The agent who persuaded the Highlanders to emigrate was called Hugh Denoon. One thing he told the Highlanders was that in Nova Scotia the same tree would produce soap, sugar, and fir (?).

"Betsey" Presentation by Paula Prest

This is Paula Prest of the Pictou County Genealogical Society and the topic today will be the "Betsey" passengers, who arrived in Pictou in 1767.

1. As you may know, at the close of the Seven Years' War, many companies were formed in the American Colonies and in Great Britain for land speculation in Nova Scotia.
2. At this time, immense land tracts were given away by Governor Montague Wilmot and his Council.
3. Some Grants distributed at this time included those given to **McNutt** in 1765; situated near Pictou Town, from Brown's Point to Caribou; the **Wentworth Grant**, covering the area surrounding Merigomish; the **Fisher Grant**, on the South Side of Pictou Harbour, and the **Philadelphia Grant** of 1765, forming the greater part of Pictou Township and a large portion of Colchester County, which is the Grant we are covering in our Genealogical Survey and a small portion of which I shall now discuss.
4. Some shareholders familiar to us were: Rev. James Lyon and Captain Thomas Harris and Robert Harris, Doctor of Medicine in Philadelphia. In 1770-73, Pagan and Dr. Witherspoon bought three shares of land in Pictou from the Philadelphia Company.
5. The Brig. "Betsey" set sail from Philadelphia with five or six families, on May 4th, 1767, captained by John Hull out of Rhode Island and Halifax. She arrived in Halifax at the end of May and discharged 3000 feet of pine boards, then continued on to Pictou, arriving on 10th June 1767.
6. These unsuspecting settlers were under the impression at this time that their land had been previously cultivated by Acadians, who, as we know, were expelled in 1755. This, of course, was untrue (the cultivation part), although the French had had a settlement on Caribou Island and also at Merigomish.
7. The passengers on board the "Betsey" were:
 - a. John Harris and his wife, who was an agent with power of attorney to portion out land.
 - b. Robert Patterson, his wife, five children and one convict slave, who was a surveyor, in charge of layout and recording of all land grants.

The custom of the day was to sell convicts to anyone who would buy them and keep them for the remainder of their sentence. The other families on board were probably farmers and husbandmen, and included:

- c. James McCabe, who was originally from Belfast, Ireland, and his wife, and six children.
 - d. John Rogers, his wife, and five children and
 - e. Henry Comminger, his wife, and four or possibly six children.
8. The settlers were met on shore by four men from Truro who had come overland to greet the newcomers and help in whatever way they could. Their names were John Otterson, Samuel Archibald, Thomas Troop, and Ephraim Howard.
9. The original town was laid out at the Town Gut. Surprisingly, Harris settled on land purchased from McNutt and *not* on Philadelphia Grant Land. Patterson made *his* first clearing at Lyons Brook, but later moved to a claim he received from McNutt, approximately at Brown's Point. McCabe was the first to clear his land situated about five miles from the town. Rogers moved inland to what is now called Rogers' Hill, and Comminger settled in Pictou, then moved to Truro, and thence to Sherbrooke where he and his family entered the ship building trade.

10. In 1768-9, they were joined by a few more families from Philadelphia, including the Rev. James Lyon, Matthew Harris, Parnabus McGee, and Robert McFadden. In 1770, according to the Return of the States of the Township of Donggal, as Pictou was then called, there were eighteen heads of families listed, with a total of 120 persons. As you can see, the community had expanded from the original five families to a sizeable settlement. These additional people had arrived in Pictou from Philadelphia, Truro, and Cumberland.

In conclusion, this settlement included at this time a Doctor, Magistrate, Surveyor, Minister, Schoolmaster, and ship builder in addition to the erection of a sawmill and provision store, and many farmers. This was quite an accomplishment for a small group of settlers in three years and formed a solid base for a thriving community.
