COUNTY ACADEMY DEPARTMENT.

TIME OF SESSION.

For the year 1893-4 the school term will begin on August 28th, 1893, and end June 30th, 1894. Vacation, two weeks at Christmas. Regular daily session, four hours, from 9 to 13 o'clock.

ADMISSION.

New students are admitted at the beginning of each term, under the "Regulations of the Council of Public Instruction relating to County Academies." Students from beyond the limits of the County are required to pay a fee of *Twelve Dollars* per term to the Clerk of the School Commissioners.

Those who have in the past paid fees for four half yearly terms will be admitted free. A ticket admitting for the full course (any number of terms necessary) may be obtained for twenty dollars. All candidates from the Town and County are admitted free upon passing the entrance examinations. The following are *exempt* from the entrance examination, viz: (a) All those who have been admitted to full standing in any County Academy subsequent to Nov. 1st, 1885. (b) Those who hold Teacher's Provincial Licenses, Provincial High School Certificates or Normal School diplomas. (c) Those who hold certificates of scholarship from any institution in any country, which the Principal shall deem equivalent to the passing of the entrance examination.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

This examination will be held yearly on the first Monday of July. The papers will be set by the Department of Education at Halifax, and will be transmitted to the Principal under seal, covering in their range what is prescribed for the common school work, as follows: (1) Grammar, Analysis and Composition. (2) Geography. (3) British and Canadian History. (4) Arithmetic, &c. (5) The elements of useful knowledge. The latter paper will be designed by the Department of Education to test the acquaintance of the candidate with the substance of the oral *Lessons on Nature* in the common school course of study; which course will also determine the limits of knowledge in all the subjects.

Those unable to pass the Entrance Examination will be admitted to either of the two Preparatory Departments on the payment of a fee of *Four Dollars* per term of six months.

CLASSIFICATION.

All admissions to the Academy are to the *First Year*, or "D" Class, unless the candidate can in the regular manner show his ability to enter a higher class.

A teaching license of Class D, or a High School Certificate of Grade D, will admit to the Second Year or Grade C. A license of Class C. or H. S. C., Grade C, will admit to the Third Year or Grade B, and a license of Class B or H. S. C., Grade B, will admit to the Fourth Year or "A" Class. For those not holding licenses or High School Certificates a Classification Examination will be held on the opening day of the term.

SUPPLEMENTARY EXAMINATIONS.

A Supplementary Examination will be held on the opening day of the term for such candidates as can show good reason for not having presented themselves at the regular examination in July.

SPECIAL STUDENTS.

Students who do not take the full course are not recognized under the regulations of the Council of Public Instruction; but they may in special cases be admitted, if deemed advisable by the Principal, providing there is no encroachment thereby on the accommodation or privileges of the regular students, and then only on presentation of a receipt from the Clerk of the School Commissioners of one dollar for exemption from the full course.

COURSE OF STUDY.

The course of study is that prescribed by the Council of Public Instruction, adapted to an institution with *four* regular teachers, and forms a syllabus of examination for the certificate of scholarship required as one of the conditions of obtaining Teachers' licenses of the several classes. Provision is made in the 3rd Year for preparing students for matriculation in Medicine, in Law, in the Royal Medical College, or for ordinary matriculation in Arts; and in the 4th year for advanced matriculation in Arts.

Course of Study for 1893-94.

FIRST YEAR OR GRADE D.

1. ENGLISH LANGUAGE—100: [a] 6th Reader, Part I, [or an author prescribed from year to year,] with critical study, word analysis, prosody and recitation; [b] Text book on English Composition, with essays, abstracts and general correspondence.
 2. ENGLISH GRAMMAR—100: Text book [excepting "notes" and "appendix"] with easy exercises in parsing and analysis.
 3. LATIN—100: As in *Collar and Daniell*, to end of Chapter LIII, or any equivalent grammar, with very easy translation and composition exercises.
 4. FRENCH—100: As in *French Principia*, Part I, or any equivalent, with easy translation and composition exercises.
 5. HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY—100. [a] Text Book of British History up to the House of Tudor, and Review of British American History. [b] Geography of North America and Europe as in Text Book.
 6. SCIENCE—100: [a=30] Physics as in *Balfour Stewart's Primer*. [b=70] Botany as in *Gray's How Plants Grow*, substituting for the details of "Flora," Part II, common or prescribed native plants.
 7. DRAWING AND BOOK-KEEPING—100: [a=20] Construction of geometrical figures and solution of easy mensuration and trigonometrical problems by mathematical instruments. [b=30] Freehand drawing as in No. 5 and 6 prescribed Text books. [c=50] Commercial forms and writing with Single Entry Book-keeping problems.
 8. ARITHMETIC—100: As in *Hamblin Smith* to the end of Section 21 (with a practical knowledge of the metric system which will be required in all grades).
 9. ALGEBRA—100: As in *Todhunter* to the end of fractions.
 10. GEOMETRY—100: Euclid I, with very easy exercises.
- NOTE—Latin and French are optional; all others imperative. The minimum aggregate for a "pass" is 400.

SECOND YEAR OR GRADE C.

1. ENGLISH LANGUAGE—100: [a] 6th Reader, Part II, [or an author prescribed from year to year] with critical study, &c., as in previous grade but more advanced. [b] Advanced Text book of English Composition with practical work. 1893, [a] 6th Reader, Part II, and *Evangeline*.

2. ENGLISH GRAMMAR—100: [a] Text book (excepting "appendix") completed with exercises in parsing and analysis.
3. LATIN 100: As in *Collar and Daniell*, complete, and *Cæsar's Invasion of Britain*, by Welch & Duffield, (MacMillan & Co., London).
4. GREEK—100: As in *Frost's Greek Primer*, (Allyn & Bacon,) to end of Part III, or *Initia Græcia*, Part I.
5. FRENCH—100: As in *French Principia*, Parts I and II, or any equivalent.
6. GERMAN—100: As in *German Principia*, Part I, or any equivalent.
7. HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY—100: [a] Text book of British History from the House of Tudor to the present time. [b] Text book of Geography, excepting North America and Europe.
8. SCIENCE—100: [a=70] Chemistry as in *Williams*. [b=30] Mineralogy as in *Crosby's Common Rocks*, or Agricultural Chemistry as in *Tanner*.
9. DRAWING AND BOOK-KEEPING—100: [a] Mathematical drawing as in previous grade continued, with prescribed Text books No. 7 and 8 in Freehand drawing. [b] Book-keeping—Double Entry forms and problems.
10. ARITHMETIC—100: Text book complete without appendix.
11. ALGEBRA—100: As in *Todhunter* to end of simple equations, including involution and evolution.
12. GEOMETRY—100: Text book with exercises to Prop. 20, Book III.

NOTE.—Latin, Greek, French and German optional; all others imperative. The minimum aggregate for a pass, 400.

THIRD YEAR OR GRADE B.

1. ENGLISH LITERATURE—100: [a] Prose authors prescribed from year to year, with critical study. [b] Poetical authors prescribed as above. 1893, (a) Macaulay's *Warren Hastings*. (b) Shakespeare's *Hamlet*.
2. ENGLISH GRAMMAR—100: [a] History of English Language and Text-book completed with difficult exercises. [b] History of English Literature: selected portions from *Stopford Brooke's Primer*. (Spencer, Shakespeare, Bacon and Milton with Chapters VI, VII and VIII.)
3. LATIN—100: Grammar and easy composition, partly based on Prose author read.
4. LATIN—100: [a] *Cæsar*, one book; [b] Virgil, one book, as prescribed from year to year, with grammatical and critical questions. (1893, [a] *De Bell, Gal.*, Book V. [b] *Aeneid*, Book III.)
5. GREEK—100: Grammar and easy composition based partly on author read.

6. GREEK—100: *Xenophon*, one book, as prescribed from year to year, with grammatical and critical questions. (1893, *Anabasis*, Book I.)

7. FRENCH—100: *Brachet's Public School Elementary French Grammar*, or an equivalent, and composition with author prescribed from year to year. (1893, *Souvestre's Un Philosophe Sous Les Toits*.)

8. GERMAN—100: *German Principia*, Parts I and II, or any equivalent.

9. HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY—100: General History and Geography as in *Swinton*.

10. PHYSIOLOGY—100: As in prescribed Text, *Martin's Human Body* [Elementary].

11. PHYSICS—100: As in *Gage's Introduction to Physical Science*.

12. PRACTICAL MATHEMATICS—100: As in *Eaton*.

13. ALGEBRA AND MATHEMATICS—100: As in *Todhunter's Algebra and Hamblin Smith's Arithmetic*.

14. GEOMETRY—100: Euclid I to IV with exercises; definitions and algebraic demonstrations of Euclid V; and Euclid VI (text).

NOTE.—Latin, Greek, French and German optional; all others imperative. The minimum aggregate for a pass, 400. The examination on this syllabus may also be known as the Junior Leaving Examination of the High School.

FOURTH YEAR OR GRADE A.

The examination on this syllabus may be known as the Senior Leaving Examination of the Academy. This portion of the course of study will be undertaken in the lines best adapted to the demands of students. There is in this grade a bifurcation of the course into a scientific side and a classical side, with minor options leading to the certificates of "A" (scientific) and "A" (classical) respectively.

(A). IMPERATIVE FOR BOTH SIDES.

1. ENGLISH LANGUAGE—100: As in *Lounsbury's English Language*, with prescribed authors. (1893, *Scott's Ivanhoe*).

2. ENGLISH LITERATURE—100: *Stopford Brooke's Primer*, with prescribed authors. (1893, *Tennyson's Princess*).

3. BRITISH HISTORY—100: As in *Green's Short History of the English People*, with the Canadian Constitution.

4. PSYCHOLOGY—100: As in James's *Text Book of Psychology* (MacMillan & Co., London,) or Maher's (*Stoneyhurst Series*).

5. SANITARY SCIENCE—100: As in the *Ontario Manual of Hygiene*.

(B). IMPERATIVE FOR CLASSICAL SIDE (Subjects for 1893).

1. LATIN GRAMMAR AND COMPOSITION—100: Grammar as in *Allen and Greenough*, and Composition as in *Bradley Arnold*, or equivalents.

2. CÆSAR—100: *De Bell. Gal.* Books V and VI.

3. CICERO AND TACITUS—100: (a) CICERO—*Pro Lege Manilia*. (b) TACITUS—*Hist.*, Book I to end of Chapter 45.

4. VIRGIL—100: *Aeneid*, Book III.

5. HORACE—100: *Odes*, Book IV.

6. ROMAN HIST. AND GEOG.—100: As in *Liddell's*.

7. GREEK GRAMMAR AND COMPOSITION—100: Grammar as in *Goodwin* and Composition as in *Fletcher & Nicholson*, or equivalents.

8. XENOPHON—100: *Anabasis*, Books I and III.

9. DEMOSTHENES—100: *De Corona*, to end of 220th paragraph.

10. EURIPIDES—100: *Alcestris*.

11. GRECIAN HIST. AND GEOG.—100: As in *Smith's*.

(C). IMPERATIVE FOR SCIENTIFIC SIDE.

1. PHYSICS—100: As in *Wormell's Natural Philosophy*.

2. CHEMISTRY—100: As in *Wilson's Inorganic Chemistry*.

3. BOTANY—100: As in *The Essentials of Botany* by Bessey (*Henry Holt & Co., New York*), with a practical knowledge of representative species of Nova Scotian flora.

4. ZOOLOGY—100: As in *Dawson's Hand-Book*, with dissection of Nova Scotian species as in *Colton's Practical Zoology*.

5. GEOLOGY—100: As in *Sir William Dawson's Hand-Book of Canadian Geology*, (excepting the details relating to the other Provinces from Page 167 to 235).

6. ASTRONOMY—100: As in *Young's Elements of Astronomy*.

7. NAVIGATION—100: As in *Norie's Epitome*.

8. TRIGONOMETRY—100: As in *Lock's Elementary Trigonometry*.

9. ALGEBRA—100: As in *Hall and Knight's Higher Algebra* (MacMillan & Co., London), to the end of Chap. XXVI, or any equivalent.

10. GEOMETRY—100: Including *Euclid VI, XI and XII*, as in *Hamblin Smith*, with exercises.

(D). OPTIONAL FOR BOTH SIDES.

1. FRENCH GRAMMAR AND COMPOSITION—100.

2. FRENCH AUTHORS—100: (1893, *Voltaire, Charles XII*, Books I, II and III, and *Racine's Athalie*).

3. GERMAN GRAMMAR AND COMPOSITION—100.

4. GERMAN AUTHORS—100: (1893, *Hauff's Das Kalte Hertz* (*Heath & Co., Boston*)).

To pass Grade A (classical) a minimum aggregate of 1000 must be made on twenty papers, including all in groups (A) and (C) and any other *five* papers.

To pass Grade A (classical) a minimum aggregate of 1000 must be made on twenty papers, including all in groups (A) and (B) and any other *four* papers.

Pine Arts Department.

This department is only affiliated to the County Academy department. Its connection consists in its being conducted in the same building under the co-ordinating control of the same Principal. It is supported by fees. Values will be given for fees in this department in the certificates presented at the terminal examination as follows: Maximum for *Drawing and Painting* 100 for each quarter. For *Pianoforte, Harmony or Vocal Culture* 100 for each quarter. *Harmony* 100. While the results will be summed in the general "aggregate" made by the student in all subjects, promotion from one class to another in the County Academy Department will be on the County Academy Curriculum.

DRAWING AND PAINTING.

Time of Session.—From 2 p. m. to 5 p. m. (three hours) on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Drawing.—A course of Freehand and Perspective.

Painting.—A course of Oils and Water Colors.

Fees per Quarter.—Drawing, \$2.50. Painting, \$5.00.

MUSIC.

PIANOFORTE.—It is intended that a student in the Musical Department of the Pictou Academy shall pursue a course of studies marked out by the institution. This course is divided into *four* grades or classes. A graduate in this department will have gone over all the work required for the first three grades in the New England Conservatory of Music, and will therefore be able to enter the *fourth* grade of the institution. A student in finishing the course is expected to give a recital, without which a certificate will not be granted. The following list of music to be studied in each grade will give an idea of the course.

First Grade—Boston or New England Conservatory Method, 1st part; Bertin's 12 Petits Morceaux and Preludes; Czerny's 101 Preparatory studies, 1st Book; Duvernoy opus 125, 1st Book; Richardson's Method, first part; Burgmuller, opus 100; Schumann's Happy Farmer, First Sorrow; Simple exercises are selected from Baumbach, Lichner, Lange, Emery and others.

Second Grade—New England or Boston Conservatory Method 2nd part; Plaidy, Czerny's 101 Preparatory Studies, 2nd Book; Studies in Velocity, 1st Book; Bortini op. 100; Loeschorn op. 65, 1st and 2nd Books; Berrens op. 120; Duvernoy, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Books; Selected pieces from Lange, Croizes, Soderman, Richner, Reisch, Pacher, Schumann's "Kinder Suenen;" Spindler and others.

Third Grade—Czerny's Etudes de Velocitie, 2nd Book. Progressive studies by Loeschorn, Berger, Bertini, A. D. Turner's Octava studies. A. D. Turner's Pedal studies. St. Heller op. 47, Selected works from Clementi, Beethoven's Sonatinas, Mendelssohn's "Leider ohne Worte," Scharvenka, Gotschalk and others.

Fourth Grade—Etudes Kalkbrennen, opus 20; Cramer's Etudes Celebre; Clementis "Gradus and Parnassum;" Mendelssohn's Preludes and Fugues; J. S. Bach's Inventions and Preludes; Krause op. 15; Czerny, Finger Fertigkeit op. 174; Mocheles op. 70; Hayden's Fantaisie in C; Rheinberger "Chase;" Beethoven Sonatas; Mendelssohn's Andante and Rondo Capriccio; Chopin, Waltzes, Nocturnes and Impromptus; Schubert's Impromptus; Moscheles' Studies, op. &c., &c.

On the piano each student will receive *two* lessons per week. A lecture on Harmony will be given *once* a week FREE to Piano students.

VOCAL CULTURE.—This system of vocal culture was studied by the instructor during the years 1887 and 1888, under Mr. Charles E. Tinhey, of the New England Conservatory of Music, formerly of the Royal Academy of London. The Garcia system of voice development is followed altogether with studies in melody by Concors, Bordogni and others. It treats of (1) breathing, (2) proper placing of register, (3) articulations, (4) correct musical rendition.

Scale of Fees, The same as for Pianoforte.

HARMONY.—(*Scale of Fees*)—Per Term of 10 Lessons.

One student, hour lessons.....\$6.00

The terms commence during the first weeks of November, February and May. Special arrangements for the interruption of summer holidays and a short autumn term.

VIOLIN.—(*Scale of Fees*)—The same as for Pianoforte.

STENOGRAPHY AND TYPE-WRITING.

Classes for instruction in Stenography and Type-writing are conducted in one of the rooms of the Academy by a competent teacher. Students will have an opportunity of receiving instructions in these branches without interfering with their attendance on the regular classes. Fee per quarter for each subject, \$6.00. Teacher, MISS BESSIE FRASER.

SCIENTIFIC WORK.

In practical Botany, Entomology, Chemistry, &c., students may join some one or more of the "clubs" of the "Pictou Academy Scientific Association." The Association is made up of sections called clubs, having organizations independent of each other, each devoted to the practical study of some branch of Natural Science. The clubs meet generally once a week in some room of the Academy building, and have the free use, when necessary, of the aid of the Academy Staff, and the privileges of the Laboratory, Museum and Library.

EXAMINATIONS AND PRIZES.

An examination of all classes will be held, beginning May 15th. Students making 50% or upwards, at this examination, will be entitled to certificates admitting them to the Provincial Examination of High School Students. On the results of this examination, also, will be awarded the following prizes presented by the Town of Pictou and the Pictou Academy "Alumni Association."

FOURTH YEAR CLASS.

1. To the student making the Highest General Aggregate—Gold Medal and \$25.00.
2. To the student making the Second Highest General Aggregate—Silver Medal and \$15.00.

THIRD YEAR CLASS.

1. Highest General Aggregate, \$20.00
2. Second Highest General Aggregate, 15.00

SECOND AND FIRST YEAR CLASSES.

Prizes amounting in all to the value of \$30.00 will be awarded to the students of the Second and Third Year Classes respectively as follows: (a) To the students of these classes making the First and Second Highest General Aggregate. (b) To the students making the First and Second Highest Aggregate in each of the four departments.

The results of this examination will be announced and the prizes distributed at the Public Examination of the Academy,

to be held on the closing day of the term. The names of all prize-winners will be published in the local newspapers, and the names of the winners of the more important ones will be recorded in the annual catalogue.

TERMINAL EXAMINATIONS AND CERTIFICATES.

The *Terminal Examinations* will be conducted at the end of the term in accordance with the regulations of the Council of Public Instruction in regard to the examination of High School students. Each candidate will receive from the Superintendent of Education a certificate containing the marks given in each subject by the examiners and the High School Grade which the candidate has successfully passed.

DALHOUSIE UNIVERSITY.

A "*Certificate*" from the Pictou Academy will admit the winner to the University of Dalhousie, Halifax, Nova Scotia, without passing the Matriculation Examination.

DISCIPLINE.

Under the School Law of the Province of Nova Scotia, the Academy is subject in its particular management to the "Rules and Regulations of the Public Schools of Pictou Town," as published and amended from time to time. Students are accountable to the ordinary disciplinary authority, even to the suspension or expulsion, for any conduct in their boarding houses or elsewhere, which tends to affect injuriously Academic discipline or the principles of sound morality. Liability to discipline exists for any offence prior to a regular withdrawal from the institution.

BOARD.

The Pictou Academy is not a Boarding School. Board is obtained in private houses, where the rate of ordinary accommodation varies from \$2.75 to \$3.00.
